Dear Chairmen and Ranking Members:

As we move into a conference committee on a long term surface transportation reauthorization bill, we urge you to maintain the 125 mph standard for diesel-electric passenger rail locomotives, and view this as the most technologically feasible and economically efficient speed for modern passenger rail locomotives.

Unfortunately, included in the Senate bill was language that would overturn the congressionally created Next Generation Equipment Committee's (NGEC) requirement that new diesel-electric passenger locomotives be capable of operating at a sustained speed of 125 mph. Specifically, Section 35203(d) in the Senate bill would replace the Committee's 125 mph specification with a slower speed of 110 mph.

Maintaining the speed of 125 mph ensures that America's passenger railroad system will be more modern, efficient, and attractive to riders. Faster passenger trains mean less travel time, and less travel time increases both ridership and revenue. Moreover, diesel-electric locomotives designed for 125 mph use less fuel, and impose less wear-and-tear on train tracks, train-wheels, and switches. The most utilized and profitable passenger railroad lines in the U.S. can already support trains traveling at 125 mph, and there is an ongoing effort in the U.S. to upgrade more tracks to support 125 mph. As we strive to build a world-class rail system, we need to increase performance and efficiency, while reducing emissions and addressing other environmental factors. Locomotives last in service for at least 25 years, so procuring 110 mph locomotives now would lock America's passenger railroad network out of faster, more popular, and more efficient service for a generation.

Congress established the NGEC to enable the key stakeholders and experts to set the technical parameters of new passenger railroad equipment through a thorough and open airing of the relevant facts. NGEC has carried out its work in the inclusive, thorough, and fact-based

manner that Congress intended and concluded that diesel-electric passenger rail locomotives be able to sustain speeds of 125 mph. Given the merits of the NGECC's work, Congress should not disregard its considered judgment.

For the reasons stated above, we oppose Section 35203(d) in the Senate bill and respectfully ask that you work to maintain the 125 mph standard for diesel-electric passenger rail locomotives in any final transportation reauthorization bill.


